What are the British Isles?

Four principal British migrations:

- 1. Puritans, mostly middle class, from eastern counties of England to Massachusetts Colony, 1629-1640.
- 2. Small Cavalier elite, some middle class, and a large group of indentured servants from western and southern English counties to Virginia Tidewater area, 1642-1675.
- 3. Quakers from north midland counties of England and Wales to Delaware Valley (Pennsylvania) 1675-1725.
- 4. English-speaking people from the northern counties of England, Scottish lowlands and Province of Ulster (Scots-Irish) to Appalachian backcountry of Pennsylvania, Virginia and Carolinas, 1718-1775.

First wave: 1717-1718 (about 5,000

came)

Reason: drought, rent-racking (James

McGregor – Boston)

Second wave: 1725-1729 (English

Parliament concerned)

Large Protestant congregations

Third wave: 1740-1741

Famine; 400,000 died in Ireland

Fourth wave: 1754-1755

Drought in Ulster, propaganda from North

Carolina

Fifth wave: 1771-1775 (high rents led to

eviction)




- 1. Click on "Search" tab at top of page.

The maps are clickable:



Learning Using FamilySearch:



- 1. On the FamilySearch sign-in screen, go to the top left ☐ "Get Help"
- Drop-down menu will take you to "Help Center".
- 3. Type in "British Isles".
 - a. There will be many courses available to teach you.
 - b. Most will have a handout.
 - c. Some are as short as twenty minutes, others may be one-hour long.
